


# **MAISD LITERACY COACH PROJECT**

The MAISD, local school districts, and the Community Foundation partnered to place a literacy coach in public school districts in Muskegon County. The literacy coaches support kindergarten through thirdgrade educators, developing literacy strategies aimed at

improving student learning.
The goal is for children to

#### LISTENING LOCATIONS

Historically, the Community Foundation has been heavily involved with the revitalization of downtown Muskegon. As downtown continues to grow, the Community Foundation is fulfilling the strategic plan to bring support to all areas around Muskegon **County.** One way we connect with areas is by listening to the voices of the individuals who live, work, and play in our community.

The Community Foundation launched its firstever **Listening Location** in October 2021 at the Us Cafe in Muskegon Heights. Each month visiting residents share stories that provide valuable insight into the needs and values of community members. Community Foundation staff have also visited the Whitehall and Montague area. The insights gained help the Community Foundation identify future partnership opportunities while staying connected to the greater community. (Photo 1)

#### **FAITH PARTNERS**


The Community Foundation began meeting with faith partners in August 2021 to explore strategies to promote and strengthen lifelong literacy. Faith leaders gathered regularly listening to speakers, networking with nonprofits, and building programs. In April 2022, the Community Foundation awarded close to \$25,000 to support 11 churches and 12 programs designed to enhance the literacy skills of adults and children. (Photo 4)

# **BUY BLACK WEEKEND**

In 2020 Jennifer Ross started the Buy Black Weekend initiative to support black-owned businesses in Muskegon County. The annual Buy Black Weekend encourages people from around the area to become familiar with the products and services the Blackowned businesses offer. The publicity from the event increases sales on the weekend of the event, while keeping these businesses top of mind throughout the year. With the first event's success in 2020, Jennifer sought funds from the Community Empowerment Small Grant program to support entrepreneurs and **small businesses** through this growing event. # TAKING BACK MUSKEGON

The Muskegon Heights Housing Commission and Taking Back Muskegon, a local volunteer organization, partnered to host a youth summer program. The program included field trips to local museums, Michigan's Adventure and community service projects. # **MUSKEGON HEIGHTS NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION COUNCIL**

Recently the Muskegon Heights Neighborhood Council (MHNAC) was founded. MHNAC has representatives from every neighborhood in Muskegon Heights. This collaborative group discusses needs for their blocks and works together to gain access and create proximity to community resources. One of MHNAC's initiatives supported by the Community Empowerment Grant was to develop marketing materials to spread the word about the services and resources available to residents. When asked why creating marketing materials was important, MHNAC informed the Community Foundation that having "trusted communication channels to and from residents is vital." (Photo 5)

# FRAUENTHAL CENTER PRESERVATION CAMPAIGN

For the last 90 years, the **Frauenthal Theater** has been the cornerstone of Downtown Muskegon. The Frauenthal's impact ripples through a diverse range of arts and entertainment experiences for West Michigan and beyond. Since the original renovation nearly 30 years ago, the Frauenthal Theater has been showing wear from ongoing use. The Community Foundation identified fundamental structural and preservation issues critical to the theater's future.

The Community Foundation launched the **Next 90 Years Campaign** to ensure these renovations keep the landmark accessible for generations. The campaign cabinet, led by Co-Chairpersons, Amy Heisser and Asaline Scott, have successfully **raised \$6.4 million.** Many renovations are complete, with more on the way. Some of the most noticeable renovations include exterior terracotta restoration, historically accurate, energy-efficient windows installed, HVAC system replacement, fire/emergency escape routes repaired and reinforced, marquee renovation, heated sidewalks, with new sound system and main stage to come.

The Impact Award recognizes an individual or organization in the community who has **gone above and beyond** to advance education, foster a dynamic local economy, and promote prosperity for all. The Community Foundation for Muskegon County awarded **Dr. Dale Nesbary** the inaugural Impact Award!

For more than 13 years, Dr.
Dale Nesbary has served as
the president of Muskegon
Community College (MCC).
His many accomplishments
include securing more than \$45
million to support the most
ambitious upgrade of MCC's
facilities since the construction
of the main campus in 1967.
Under Dr. Nesbary's leadership,
MCC was twice named the
top Community College in

Michigan. Nesbary worked alongside the MAISD to make the Promise Scholarship possible for Muskegon County students, and alongside the MCC Board of Trustees to create the Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. This office serves as a resource to nonprofits and small businesses.



# Judy Drew Rahrig grew up in downtown Muskegon. She and her late husband, Joe, were high school sweethearts, and one of their first dates was at the Michigan Theater, now the Frauenthal Center. Muskegon was good to their family and business, and it was **important to them to give back.**Working alongside her financial advisor, Bob Garretson, and their family estate atterney.

# CELEBRATING YOUTH ENGAGEMENT

# WHAT ARE OUR YOUTH SAYING?

The Muskegon County Youth Advisory Council (YAC) surveyed **461 high school students** in Muskegon County to understand the issues impacting them today. The Youth Empowerment Survey (YES) findings identified three areas where they will allocate future grant awards:

- Mental Health
- Substance Use
- Racial Discrimination

YAC is a collective of youth grantmakers who represent 16 Muskegon-area high schools. This team meets monthly to allocate **over \$60,000** to local youth-serving organizations and projects. When YAC isn't grantmaking, it's planning community service projects and site visits to the organizations it funds.

# **POWER OF THE ARTS**

Diatribe is a local non-profit organization that uses performing arts to **empower young people** to share their stories, raise awareness of social issues, and create change within their communities. Diatribe connects with youth in a creative way that helps work through mental health challenges, and is proven to help students improve their English and writing skills. Diatribe has been present in various schools and programs, including Muskegon Community Education Center, the Poppen Program, Orchard View, Muskegon Public Schools, North Muskegon, Muskegon Heights Public School System, and Pathfinders.

# **LEAD MUSKEGON GIVING CIRCLE**LEADING EFFORTS AGAINST DISCRIMINATION

The LEAD Muskegon Giving Circle enhances

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) work
in Muskegon County. This growing group of
diverse members, aged 50 and under, meet
regularly to share DEI-focused resources
and discuss current issues. Each member is
committed to giving a gift of \$400 each year.
Half of the funds stay in the LEAD Fund to build
the endowment; members vote on a non-profit
partner to receive the other half to support DEI
work in Muskegon County.

In 2021, LEAD members voted to grant Legal Aid of Western Michigan funds to support local expungement clinics.

# MCC OFFICE OF DEI

Together, the Community Foundation, the City of Muskegon, Goodwill Industries, Mercy Health, United Way of the Lakeshore, Shape Corporation, and the Howmet Aerospace Foundation **raised over \$170,000** to support the Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion at Muskegon Community College.

The newly appointed Chief Diversity Officer (CDO), Ken James, has begun implementing a DEI strategy to catalyze best practices and resources across the campus and our community. One of Ken's goals is to ensure that **ALL INDIVIDUALS** can thrive and be engaged here in Muskegon County.

In 2022 Ken plans to expand the DEI Office to push out more training opportunities. Additionally, Ken is working to obtain grants for a racial dialogue, similar to the Institute for Healing Racism, and to offer more one-on-one training in the coming years.

# FARM, AGRICULTURE, RESEARCH, AND MANUFACTURING (FARM)

The Greater Muskegon Economic Development, West Michigan Food Processing Association, Muskegon Community College (MCC), and the Community Foundation have worked collaboratively to create the Food, Agriculture, Research, and Manufacturing facility (FARM). FARM, a 8,000-square-foot facility, is operated in partnership with Michigan State University Extension/MSU Product Center Services (MSU). Collectively, they bring **resources and business supports** to growing agribusinesses operating out of FARM and link college students (MSU and MCC) with entrepreneurs.

Located on MCC's campus, the center is an accelerator and business development center targeting first and second-stage food processors. The businesses have grown out of small kitchen spaces, such as Kitchen 242, but aren't ready for a larger processing facility. Since opening in early 2021, three food processors have called FARM their home, receiving business support and technical assistance.

The photo to the right showcases **Fry Daddy's Brand Party Mix** at FARM. Fry Daddy's Brand first sold their family recipe of irresistible mixes to family and friends, then to our community at local Farmers Markets. With an overwhelming response from the community, owners Dan and Morgan Buehler are utilizing FARM to grow their business to the next level. You can now find Fry Daddy's Brand in Meijer stores around Michigan.




# **INVESTING IN HOUSING**

The City of Muskegon has partnered with the Community Foundation and local businesses to provide new housing and **revitalize the Jackson Hill neighborhood** with an in-fill housing pilot. The Community Foundation has provided needed bridge-financing, in the form of a loan.

The project invests in a neighborhood with many vacant, buildable lots with the goal of stabilizing the neighborhood, increasing home values, and growing the number of owner-occupied residences. It has been important to the City of Muskegon to provide the opportunity to builders, realtors, and buyers that reflect the neighborhood. This project aligns with the Community Foundation's strategic goals by fostering a dynamic, local economy, empowering people to build assets, and intentionally including local-owned minority businesses.

Jackson Hill resident Rudy Briggs, Briggs Enterprises Construction Company is the general contractor, and Muskegon resident Terri Kitchen, the realtor, were hired by the City of Muskegon to complete the project. Before construction was complete, the first two homes sold at a market rate allowing the City to reinvest funds in new construction projects as the pilot continues.





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
