A. Portia Rothschild Scholarship	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of A. Portia Rothschild, who established the A. Portia Rothschild Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. A. Portia Rothschild, a retired Muskegon Heights High School counselor, moved from Muskegon but did not forget the years she spent caring for and guiding thousands of Muskegon Heights students. Always a community activist, she worked hardest when addressing issues involving youth and the disadvantaged.</i></p>
Adam Visser Memorial Scholarship	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Gene Gifford, who established the Adam Visser Memorial Scholarship Fund of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County in honor of Adam Visser a former Jayhawk all-conference player and a member of the 1990 national runner-up squad. Adam battled ALS (Lou Gehrig's Disease) for three years and passed away on February 16, 2007. "Adam was a tremendous competitor," said Gene Gifford, who coached him at MCC. He was a great person and a tremendous father and husband who courageously fought the battle against ALS.</i></p>
Adult Student Scholarship	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of various donors, who contributed to this scholarship fund of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. This scholarship is to support Muskegon County residents (or residents of a Muskegon-based school district) who have been out of high school for at least two years and/or have a gap in their post-secondary education. Adult students are often (but not always) prospective undergraduate students who are 25 years of age or older. Adult students may also have other identifying criteria, such as full-time employment, parenthood, care of elderly parents, or prior military service.</i></p>
Alan G. (1954) and Margaret Drost (1957) Toxopeus Western Michigan Christian High School Scholarship	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Alan & Margaret Toxopeus, who established the Alan G. (1954) and Margaret Drost (1957) Toxopeus Western Michigan Christian High School Scholarship of the Muskegon County Community Foundation. Both Alan and Margaret were graduates of Western MI Christian High School - 1957/58. Allen attended Michigan State University and went on to become an accountant. Margaret attended Calvin College and went on to become a Radiologist. They created this scholarship fund because they appreciated the good education they received when they attended Western Michigan Christian High School. This scholarship is for graduating seniors of Western Michigan Christian High School.</i></p>
Albrechtsen Scholarship	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Dennis and Sue Albrechtsen, who established the Albrechtsen Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Dennis and Sue Albrechtsen, long-time Whitehall residents. Dennis is a former General Manager of Howmet Whitehall Casting. Having a genuine concern for students who may not be interested in pursuing a traditional college degree, they established the Albrechtsen Scholarship to assist Whitehall High School graduating seniors to attend technical or vocational training programs.</i></p>
Albrechtsen-VanLoon Scholarship	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Dennis and Sue Albrechtsen, who established the Albrechtsen-VanLoon Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Dennis and Sue Albrechtsen are long-time Whitehall residents. The Albrechtsens believe in Whitehall Schools. They wanted to support the work that John VanLoon, a former Whitehall High School Principal, was doing. This Fund is unusual because it not only supports students, it also rewards teachers who demonstrate the ability to motivate students to achieve at high levels. His goal is to impact lives.</i></p>
Alex Christopher U.A.#174 Memorial Scholarship	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the friends and family of Alex Christopher, who established the Alex Christopher U.A.#174 Memorial Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. This fund is created in memory of Alex Christopher. With support from U.A.#174, Sharon Christopher created this fund to support other young people like her son. The awards may be used for tools, equipment, or other workforce support as determined by U.A.#174.</i></p>
Alfonso Loera Music Scholarship	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the friends and family of Alfonso Loera, who established the Alfonso Loera Music Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Alfonso Loera was a gifted musician who continuously touched the hearts of all who knew him and heard him perform. Born and raised in Muskegon, Alfonso was a graduate of the Musician's Institute in Hollywood and was well known for his talent as a guitarist and singer. His life was tragically cut short at the age of 35, but his love of music will live on through the Alfonso Loera Music Scholarship Fund. This fund will enable young musicians to pursue their musical goals unhindered by financial need.</i></p>
Alice Mae McGuire Memorial Scholarship	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Mr. Raymond J. McGuire, who established the Alice Mae McGuire Memorial Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County in memory of his wife, Alice. This scholarship is presented to students transferring from Muskegon Community College who attended MCC on a two-year, full-time basis and who will be pursuing a degree or certification at any Michigan accredited educational institution.</i></p>
American Legion Auxiliary Unit of Merritt Lamb Post No. 9 Scholarship	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the American Legion Auxiliary Unit of Merritt Lamb Post No. 9, who established the American Legion Auxiliary Unit of Merritt Lamb Post No. 9 Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. This fund was created to honor the memory and work of the Auxiliary and is to be given to veteran, child or grandchild of a veteran.</i></p>
Archie A. and Elva M. Blood Scholarship	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Archie Blood, Jr. who established the Archie A. and Elva M. Blood Scholarship Fund of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County to honor his parents. He says they were "silent givers." His father was a quiet war hero, and they both gave a great deal to the community, without notoriety. Arthur and Ida Kuehnl Memorial Scholarship	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Floyd Kuehnl, who established the Arthur and Ida Kuehnl Memorial Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Muskegon native Floyd Kuehnl spent his career as a nurse and retired from Mercy General Health Partners in 1999. He has established a scholarship in the name of his parents for students planning to pursue careers in nursing. Both Arthur and Ida Kuehnl worked in the community, Arthur was a machinist at Continental Motors and Ida worked at J.C. Penney's. Floyd Kuehnl says that it is because of his parents' hard work and support that he has been able to create this scholarship.</i></p>

<p>Barbara J. Lonnee Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Rudy and Barbara Lonnee, who established the Barbara J. Lonnee Scholarship of the Muskegon County Community Foundation. Rudy Lonnee and his wife Barbara had been long-time residents and contributing citizens of Ravenna. Rudy Lonnee's family founded Alloyed Gray Iron Foundry, a major employer in the Ravenna area for many years. Barbara taught in the Ravenna Public School system and served in the local Girl Scout program. Both loved the Ravenna community and wanted to make a lasting gift to its students. Rudy created the Barbara J. Lonnee Scholarship after Barbara's passing in honor of her. This scholarship represents the fulfillment of this generosity, which will continue to grant the lasting gift of education to the youth of their community.</i></p>
<p>Ben and Ruth Marcus Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Ruth Marcus, who established the Ben and Ruth Marcus Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Ruth Marcus was a champion of women here in Muskegon County for nearly half a century. Through her work as a board member at Muskegon Community College, Community Mental Health, Every Woman's Place, and Muskegon Area Planned Parenthood, she served as an advocate for women, inspiring them to pursue higher education, to take a greater role in the political arena, and to let their voice be heard in important causes. Her husband, Ben, was a leading worker's compensation attorney and a pioneer in this field. Ben Marcus came to Muskegon after World War II, a time when over 50 workers a year were dying in Muskegon Foundries due to lung disease. In 1995, he was inducted into the Michigan Worker's Hall of Fame and received the State Bar of Michigan's Champion of Justice Award. His work on behalf of Michigan's workers will remain a strong legacy in the field of labor law. The Marcus' Fund will provide financial assistance to area students who will attend Muskegon Community College.</i></p>
<p>Bernard J. DeVries Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of JoAnn DeVries, who established the Bernard J. DeVries Scholarship Fund of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. JoAnn established the Bernard J. DeVries Scholarship Fund in memory of her father, Bernard. The fund will be used to present scholarships to graduating seniors, with preference to those graduating from Muskegon High School. The recipients must be pursuing a degree program at a four-year accredited college, university or vocational/technical school.</i></p>
<p>Beverley Turner Memorial Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Peter Turner, who established the Beverley Turner Memorial Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Beverley Turner, in 1972, moved to Muskegon from Canada and shortly thereafter became an instructor at Muskegon Community College. This has been established in memory of Beverley by Peter Turner, her husband. The grants scholarship awards to graduates of Muskegon Community College who wish to continue their education. This and its purpose reflect Beverley Turner's life-long interest in and dedication to excellence in education. To the credit of Mr. Turner and his generosity Beverley Turner continues to inspire academic excellence in the Muskegon youth through the lasting gift of education.</i></p>
<p>Bonnie, Kenneth and Charles Buitendorp Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Kenneth Buitendorp, who established the Bonnie, Kenneth and Charles Buitendorp Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. This scholarship will be given to students demonstrating financial need and scholastic ability.</i></p>
<p>Bruce and Antonia Privacky Memorial Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Bruce & Shirley Privacky, who established the Bruce and Antonia Privacky Memorial Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. The entire community was devastated by the tragedy of Bruce and Antonia who died in a car crash. Bruce & Shirley established this in memory of their grandchildren, Bruce and Antonia Privacky. This scholarship is for Coopersville and Ravenna students who are attending attending any "public" college/university in the State of MI.</i></p>
<p>Busker Family Fund Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Walter E. Busker, who established the Busker Family Fund of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Walter Busker was a long time Muskegon resident and a member of the First Congregational Church. He joined Campbell, Wyant and Cannon, in 1951 as Chief Financial Officer. He served in a number of positions until his retirement in 1976. As their four children grew up, the Buskers continually emphasized the importance of education. The Busker Family Fund mirrors these values, as one third of the income from the Fund provides scholarships for young people in the Muskegon area. Through the creation of the Busker Family Fund, Walter Busker's emphasis on education has grown into a lasting reality, granting the permanent gift of education to the youth of his community.</i></p>
<p>Busker Family Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the William Busker family, who established the Busker Family Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. This is a competitive scholarship for the study of science, technology, engineering, math, teaching, nursing, accounting, or a trade or vocational skills. You have been chosen because we believe that you have ability and are motivated to reach your potential. The Busker family believes that by completing your education you will be able to improve your own economic well-being and the well-being of your community. They also believe that giving back is a practice that should begin early and become a lifetime habit. Wesley Wilbur Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Wesley served his community as a business leader and a community advocate. Following his death in 1989, Mr. Wilbur's family and friends created this scholarship in memory of his character and his service to the Muskegon community. This awards a scholarship to a Mona Shores High School graduate pursuing a degree in chemical or environmental engineering. To the credit of the family and friends of C. Wesley Wilbur, Mr. Wilbur continues to support the Muskegon community, granting the lasting gift of education.</i></p>
<p>C.T. Anton Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the Anton Family, who established the C.T. Anton Scholarship Fund in 2017 with an original funding grant from the Anton Family Fund at the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. The Anton Family Fund was started by Chris T. Anton, a founding member of Newkirk Electric Associates Inc., a Muskegon based electrical and engineering contractor. Mr. Anton was actively involved in numerous charities in the Muskegon Community, with a longtime goal of a scholarship fund for Muskegon County students interested in engineering and construction.</i></p>
<p>Carl Education Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Sabra Carl, who established the Carl Education Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County in memory of her parents Lawrence & Charlotte. Lawrence was a long-time Muskegon Heights merchant and leader in city and county civic affairs. The quality of education was very important to both Lawrence & Charlotte. This scholarship is for Muskegon County students pursuing any degree of course of study at Muskegon Community College or Stevenson Higher Education Center degrees from Grand Valley State University, Western Michigan University, or Ferris State University.</i></p>

Charles and Carol Mullally Scholarship	<i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of an anonymous donor, who established the Charles and Carol Mullally Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. This scholarship is for Reeths-Puffer High School graduating seniors who have demonstrated academic achievement.</i>
Charles and Jessie Goodnow Educational Scholarship	<i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Charles and Jessie Goodnow, who established the Charles and Jessie Goodnow Educational Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Sometimes it is the very quiet people that ask for little, but through their generosity truly make a difference in the world. Charles and Jessie Goodnow had vacationed in Muskegon for years and loved the area so much that they moved here in the 1930s and made Muskegon their home. Although neither of them attended college, both appreciated the value of education. The Goodnows lived an austere lifestyle that enabled them to build a sizable estate, and, since they had no children of their own, they chose to use their estate to make a gift of education to Muskegon area students. The Goodnows produced this gift through the creation of the Community Foundation's first scholarship. The income from this fund has awarded over one and a half million dollars in scholarships to Muskegon youth, continuing to grant Charles and Jessie Goodnow's lasting gift of education to the current and future generations of Muskegon County youth.</i>
Charles D. & Virginia Gay Van Vleck Scholarship	<i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Charlie and Gay Van Vleck, whose bequest established the Charles D. & Virginia Gay Van Vleck Scholarship Fund of the Community Foundation of Muskegon County. Charlie Van Vleck was a salesman his entire life, starting in a shoe store at age 17 and finishing with a 30-year career with Shaw Barton of Ohio. He was an Optimist member for 49 years, a cancer survivor, and an active volunteer and member of St. Paul's Episcopal Church along with his wife, Gay. Raised in Arkansas, Gay was high school valedictorian and earned a masters degree. Her career path included teaching, working for Delta Airlines, and serving as executive director of the Girl Scout Council in Michigan, where she met Charlie who was a board member. She retired from Muskegon School District as an English/Journalism teacher. Their scholarship provides awards to Muskegon County residents who are pursuing an undergraduate degree.</i>
Charlotte M. Martin Classical Music Scholarship	<i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Charlotte M. Martin, who established the Charlotte M. Martin Classical Music Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Charlotte Martin wanted her interest in classical music to continue after her death in February 2002. This Fund will be used to provide scholarships to students planning to study classical music and in need of assistance to do so. In this way, Ms. Martin's thoughtful giving will help assure the future of the musical arts community in Muskegon.</i>
Cheryl Duff Memorial Scholarship	<i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the friends and family of Cheryl Duff, who established the Cheryl Duff Memorial Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Cheryl Duff, an extremely-valued member of our community, participated actively in the world around her. This included involving herself with Immanuel Lutheran Church and teaching Sunday school. She was 28 when she died in a tragic automobile accident in June of 1991. Friends and family have established this in Cheryl's memory. Through this award, Cheryl's desire to help and give to others will continue to benefit the community.</i>
Community Dental Endowment Scholarship	<i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the Muskegon District Dental Society, who established the Community Dental Endowment Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. This scholarship is for students pursuing dental-related careers.</i>
Concerned Hearts Cardiovascular Nurse Scholarship	<i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the Concerned Hearts Club of Michigan, who established the Concerned Hearts Cardiovascular Nurse Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. The fund was established to create educational opportunities to cardio-vascular nurses or students who have been admitted to an accredited school and expressed a desire to establish a career as a cardio-vascular nurse.</i>
Cutler Family Scholarship	<i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the Robert M. Cutler family, who established the Cutler Family Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Robert Cutler was a retired Howmet executive as well as a former County Commissioner. His wife, Betsy, taught and provided counseling for 19 years at Reeths Puffer High School while also serving as President of the Michigan Pine and Dunes Girl Scout Council. The Cutlers both devoted themselves to community activism and valued education very highly. Accordingly, they wanted to make a gift to help young people in the community to pursue higher education. Through a gift to the Community Foundation for Muskegon County, this inspiration became the Cutler Family Scholarship. The award is for a Reeths Puffer graduate who excels in math and/or science and is planning to pursue a degree in either of these disciplines. By creating this scholarship, the Cutler's heightened their regard for education into a lasting reality, granting the permanent gift of education to the youth of their community.</i>
Dan White Memorial Scholarship	<i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the family of Dan White, who established the Dan White Memorial Scholarship Fund in his memory. The Dan White Scholarship Fund was setup after Dan White, a 5th grade teacher at Campbell Elementary School, was killed by a drunk driver. Dan created a legacy of outstanding passion for teaching his students and dedication to the advancement of his profession. In his role at Campbell School, he invigorated his love of teaching with dedication and exuberance. This scholarship is to provide financial assistance to students who are enrolled in the teaching field or another human services "giving back" profession.</i>
Darrell H. and Rosaline M. Smith Scholarship	<i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Rosaline M. Smith, who established the Darrell H. and Rosaline M. Smith Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Rosaline a former Treasurer for the City of Muskegon, and Darrell Smith, a longtime employee of the Muskegon Post Office, who cared deeply for each other and shared more than 50 years of marriage. Music was something they loved and had very much in common. The Darrell H. and Rosaline M. Smith was created to honor Darrell, who is no longer with us, and to provide a helping hand to graduating seniors of any Muskegon County high school who have demonstrated academic achievement and will pursue a music degree.</i>
Dennis L. and Susan K. Emmons Instrumental Music Scholarship	<i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Dennis & Susan Emmons, who established the Dennis L. and Susan K. Emmons Instrumental Music Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. A graduate of Muskegon High School and Michigan State University, Dennis taught at Grant Public Schools from 1965 -1967 before returning to Muskegon. He was a band Director at Nelson Junior High from 1967-1970, and was named band director at North Muskegon Public Schools in the fall of 1970. Dennis returned to Muskegon in the fall of 1986 where he served as director at Bunker Middle School and assisted at Muskegon High School until his retirement in 1994. This scholarship supports band students at North Muskegon High School, Muskegon High School, and Reeths-Puffer High School.</i>
Dollie Mae Damm Scholarship	<i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Dorothy Boyden, Jane McPherson and Peter Damm, who established the Dollie Mae Damm Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Dorothy and Jane had always wanted to do something in memory of their mother, Dollie Mae, an early Muskegon resident. The award provides scholarships to students who will pursue education careers.</i>
Dolores J. Swanson Scholarship	<i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Dolores E. Swanson who established the Dolores (Dee) E. Swanson Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Dee became a Ravenna resident when she married Don Swanson over 50 years ago. She taught and mentored new teachers at Ravenna Public Schools for 32 of those years while he ran the family business, Swanson Pickle Co., Incorporated. She established this Fund to provide scholarships to graduates of Ravenna High School, and to give back to the school and community that has been so good to them and their family.</i>

<p>Don Harwood Nursing Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Don Harwood and his brother Vernon, who established the Don Harwood Nursing Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Don Harwood, a bachelor who lived most of his life in Muskegon, spent his last three years in a nursing home, where he received excellent nursing care. Upon his death in 1981, his brother Vernon, following Mr. Harwood's wishes, set up a scholarship fund to make awards to students pursuing a career in nursing or health care. To the credit of Don Harwood's foresight and Vernon Harwood's loyalty to his brother's wishes, Muskegon County students pursuing degrees in health care continue to receive the lasting gift of education.</i></p>
<p>Don and Linda Potter Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Don and Linda Potters, who established the Don and Linda Potter Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Graduates of Muskegon High School, Don & Linda Potter enjoyed successful careers in hospital administration. They're creating this scholarship fund to help students in years 3-5 of healthcare or education degrees.</i></p>
<p>Donald and Jane Tjarksen Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Donald and Jane Tjarksen, who established the Donald and Jane Tjarksen Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Don and Jane Tjarksen, long-time residents of North Muskegon, have remained consistent and notable contributors to their community. Donald has owned and run a successful business, and Jane instructed math for many years at Reeths-Puffer. The Tjarksen's share a desire to provide a scholarship to North Muskegon and Reeths-Puffer High School graduating seniors who plan to major in math or science. Walters, a teacher at North Muskegon High School, who died in 1987 following a two-year battle with cancer. <p>Doris-Jane Horton Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Doris-Jane Horton, who established the Doris-Jane Horton Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. In 2009, Doris passed away at the age of 91. Known to her friends as Doris, Doris-Jane, or DJ, she was a big fan of the Muskegon Big Reds. Because of her love of sports, she established this scholarship to support Muskegon High School graduating seniors who are participants in school-sponsored and organized sports teams.</i></p>
<p>Dorothy Creason Tyler English Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the Tyler Family, who established the Dorothy Creason-Tyler English Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. This scholarship is intended for graduating seniors from North Muskegon High School, who have an aptitude and passion for English. This scholarship fund established by his mother and father, Mary and Lynn Marcil and his wife Kelly, will benefit Reeths-Puffer students desiring to attend college, who share Eric's passion for soccer.

Henry Hansen, whose Norwegian parents immigrated to Muskegon during the lumbering era, was a self-taught man and a voracious reader who never stopped learning. Henry and his wife Ethelyn, long-time members of Samuel Lutheran Church, had no children and wanted to help young people achieve their dreams of higher education. Accordingly, awards from the Hansen Scholarship are given to worthy students who are members of Harbor of Grace Lutheran Church. Through this fund, the Hansen's continue to grant the lasting gift of education to Muskegon students.

Herremans Scholar-Athlete Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Todd Herremans, who established the Herremans Scholar-Athlete Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Todd Herremans, All Stater, Division II, All American, and graduate of Ravenna High School had a successful career with the National Football League's Philadelphia Eagles from 2005-2014. Even though he lived out of state for many years, he never forgot about his home. He established this scholarship fund to honor both the scholar and athletic student at Ravenna High School.

Hispanic Community Services Coalition Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the Hispanic Community Services Coalition, who established the Hispanic Community Services Coalition Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. The Mission of the Hispanic Services Coalition of Muskegon County is to serve the Hispanic community through education, health information and services as an instrument in improving their quality of life. HCSC promotes the Hispanic culture within Muskegon County and acts as a cultural reference. This scholarship is for a Hispanic or Latino graduating seniors who are residents of and/or attend high school in Muskegon County.

Howard Oosterhouse Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Howard F. Oosterhouse, who established the Howard Oosterhouse Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Howard F. Oosterhouse was born on November 18, 1934 to Dan and Dorothy Oosterhouse who lived in Paris Township located southeast of Grand Rapids, Michigan. He was raised in this farming community with strong values toward hard work, and more importantly, to a deep Christian belief which surrounded his entire life. Through support of family and community, Howard graduated from Caledonia High School in 1953 and then continued his education at Calvin College, earning his Bachelor of Arts in education in 1957. In 1961 he received his Master of Arts in Education from the University of Michigan. His career included positions as math teacher at Kalamazoo Christian School and Zeeland Christian School. The majority of his career ensued at Steele Middle School, part of Muskegon Public Schools where he taught for 31 years until his retirement. Howard was dedicated to the education of youth. His faith and relationship to Jesus Christ influenced his interactions with other people and helped set his priorities. One of his personal goals was the development of this scholarship so that his positive influence on the education of young people could continue beyond his lifetime.

Hugh and Peg Campbell Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Peggy Elliott and Hugh Campbell, who established the Hugh and Peg Campbell Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County in memory of Peg Campbell. Margaretha (Peg) Campbell graduated from Muskegon High School, her husband Hugh from Muskegon Heights High School. They went on to raise seven children here. Hugh and their daughter, Peggy, have established the Hugh and Peg Campbell Scholarship Fund in Peg's memory. Peg was active in sports at a time when women were not encouraged to pursue them. She especially loved softball and played for Muskegon Lassies, part of the All-American Girls Professional Baseball League, for several years. Hugh and Peg have already been generous in giving back to the community as evidenced by the Peg Campbell Soccer Field at Muskegon Catholic High School, the playground at Laketon Township and the scholarship at GMI Kettering where Hugh received his education, before founding Campbell Grinder Company.

Inez Lundwall Ortquist Educational Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Inez Lundwall Ortquist, who established the Inez Lundwall Ortquist Educational Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. A beloved teacher at Ludington and Muskegon public schools for almost 30 years, friends and acquaintances say it is not at all surprising that Inez Lundwall Ortquist's generous spirit is still benefiting the community and making a difference in people's lives even after her death. During her lifetime Ortquist created a Living Trust that calls for the creation of a designated fund. This fund supports several organizations and purposes: scholarships for outstanding students or teachers in any Muskegon County school; Lakeshore Youth for Christ; the American Cancer Society; Hospice of Muskegon-Oceana and the Lakeshore Lung Society.

J. Dean and Carolyn L. Owen (Carolee) Memorial Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of J. Dean Owen, their family and friends in memory of his wife Carolee Owen. Carolee was a dedicated community volunteer and this fund will provide scholarships to graduates of Muskegon County High Schools who are planning on attending a college or university within the state of Michigan. In 2015 J. Dean passed away. The family and friends of J. Dean and Carolee Owen can be assured that hundreds of young people, for years to come, will benefit from this fund established in her memory.

J. Fred & Helen Barnard Boyd Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Dr. Helen Barnard and J. Fred Boyd, who established the J. Fred and Helen Barnard Boyd Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Dr. Helen Barnard Boyd was one of the first women to attend the University of Michigan Medical School, and was also Muskegon's first female doctor. J. Fred Boyd was a prominent Muskegon businessman. They shared a commitment to youth and education, and often took troubled young people into their home to give them a second chance in life. In the 1960s, these two Muskegon patrons established a private foundation, which they incorporated with the Community Foundation for Muskegon County in the early 1970's. Since the creation of this and because of its tremendous impact, hundreds of Muskegon students have received awards which have helped them with their education. Dr. Helen Barnard and J. Fred Boyd lived long and fruitful lives. Through the establishment of this, they have left a permanent legacy for Muskegon area youth.

J. Paul Dunworth Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of J. Paul Dunworth, who established the J. Paul Dunworth Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. J. Paul Dunworth taught at Muskegon Public Schools for 40 years. While he never married, he loved Muskegon, which had been his home since 1926. When Mr. Dunworth died in 1981, he left his entire estate to the Community Foundation. Following his death, the contents of his safe deposit box revealed various letters from Robert Kennedy and hundreds of John F. Kennedy five-cent postage commemorative stamps. On the stamps read the statement: "And the glow from that fire can truly light the world." J. Paul Dunworth lived by these words, evidenced by his charitable donation that will continue to grant the permanent gift of education to students in Muskegon County.

Jack & Kathy Myers Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of siblings Greg, Jeff, & Lisa Meyers, who honored their parents by establishing the Jack & Kathy Myers Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Jack Myers graduated from Western Michigan Christian High School in 1957. He attended Calvin College for a three-year curriculum in pre-engineering, completing his degree in electrical engineering at the University of Michigan. Jack and Kathy met at U of M, where she completed a degree in education to pursue a career in teaching at the elementary school level. They married in 1962 and sent their three children to Southfield Christian School in the Detroit Metropolitan area. Sadly, Jack passed away at a young age, but Kathy lived to see her two granddaughters follow in their grandfather's footsteps and graduate from WMC sixty years later. Given Jack and Kathy's commitment to Christian education and connection to Western Michigan Christian High School, the scholarship is awarded to graduating students of WMC going on to either Calvin University or the University of Michigan, which Jack and Kathy held dear.

Jack Schimke Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Jack Schimke, who established the Jack Schimke Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Jack Schimke, an area business owner and friend of the community, embodied the idea that everyone has something to give back to their community. Jack was a well-known and well-liked butcher, a long-time employee of Eberhard Foods and, later co-owner of Butcher Boy of North Muskegon. Jack Schimke's contagious good nature and smile behind the counter will live on through his generosity to his community. The Jack Schimke will be used for scholarships for vocational and other training at an accredited institution.

Jackson-Merkey Contractors Educational Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Steve Jackson and Gary Merkey, who established the Jackson-Merkey Contractors Educational Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Steve Jackson and Gary Merkey have been friends since high school and business partners for many years now. They were really excited to start this fund and wish they had thought of it long ago. This scholarship will benefit Muskegon County high school graduates working toward any degree but with a preference given to students pursuing a degree in Civil Engineering or Construction Management.

James A. and Elfrieda E. Murphy Memorial Scholarship

The entire community was devastated by the tragedy of the Privacky family deaths. These scholarship awards are made to those who closely mirror his values. Following his military service, Ray Smith relocated to Cleveland, Ohio, to pursue his career, start his business, and raise his family. It was at that time that he became an active Rotarian, serving as a hands-on member. He was elected to the full succession of officer positions, and in retirement volunteered to fill in wherever and whenever needed until into his late 70's. It seems totally fitting that this patriot, who himself did not have the formal education that we worked so hard for others to achieve, was called home on Memorial Day. May those who receive this scholarship honor him with their own education, achievement and success.</i></p>
<p>Raymond and Teresa Cioe Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Raymond and Teresa Cioe, who established the Raymond and Teresa Cioe Scholarship Fund of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Ray and his sisters, Teresa and Angela, lived together and were known as frugal, saving every cent they could. Angela passed away many years ago, Teresa worked for Muskegon Federal Savings and Loan and Ray worked for years at Continental Motors. Though never married, the Cioes loved children and had a life-long vision of helping students who chose to receive a faith-based education. Ray left Continental Motors to pursue a degree that would allow him to teach. In 1954, he began teaching at Catholic Central, also serving as the School's business manager, business teacher, athletic director, football, basketball and golf coach. Recognizing Ray's dedicated service to Catholic Central athletics, in 1993 he received the Muskegon Area Sports Hall of Fame Distinguished Service Award. At Teresa's death, the Cioe's estate plan directed that a portion go to the Community Foundation to establish the Raymond and Teresa Cioe Fund which will present scholarships to Muskegon Area students who wish to attend independent colleges such as Notre Dame, Aquinas or Albion.</i></p>

Reading is the Key Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Lori Goryl who established the Reading is the Key Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. After several years of teaching, Lori Goryl, found her professional home in the Title 1 program, where small group teaching helps those students who need an extra boost. Her Adopt-A-Reader Program at Reeths-Puffer McMillan Elementary has been pairing up reading volunteers with elementary students for 13 years. Lori has since retired, but still wants to continue encouraging children to pursue higher educational goals. She established this scholarship fund for students who attended McMillan Elementary to help with college expenses.

Reverend Moses J. Jones Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Reverend Moses J. Jones, who established the Reverend Moses J. Jones Endowment Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Born in 1898, Reverend Moses J. Jones was one of Muskegon's most beloved ministers. The Pastor of John Wesley A.M.E. Zion Church of Muskegon for 36 years, he founded the Urban League of Muskegon and received numerous honors including the Ambassador of Goodwill Award. Reverend Jones committed his life to building racial harmony in Muskegon. He helped establish this Scholarship in 1982 to make awards to deserving youths based on their contributions to their community, school, and church. Through this, Reverend Moses J. Jones continues to support the values of community awareness and harmony by granting the lasting gift of education to Muskegon-area youth. Reverend Jones died in 1989. His legacy lives on through this fund.

Rich McCarthy Oakridge Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Nancy McCarthy, who established the Rich McCarthy Oakridge Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Rich McCarthy knew what matters most in life. His philosophy was: "One hundred years from now, it will not matter what kind of car I drove or what kind of clothes I wore. All that will matter is that I made a difference in the life of a child." His family members, who have established the Rich McCarthy Oakridge Scholarship in his memory, say he far surpassed his goal affecting the lives of scores of young people. The teaching veteran and coach had a rich career at Oakridge as well as several other area schools. Although he struggled with severe health problems for many years he is remembered by wife Nancy as "always smiling; his greatest joy was making people laugh." The scholarship will benefit students of Oakridge Schools.

Richard and Barbara Arter Fine Arts Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Barbara Arter, who established the Richard and Barbara Arter Fine Arts Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County in memory of Dick Arter. This fund was established following Dick Arter's unexpected death while wintering in Arizona. He had been Vice President of Howmet Corporation until his retirement and was an active member of the Community United Methodist Church, past President of the Reeths-Puffer Board of Education, and United Way. Prior to Barbara's retirement, she taught sixth grade at Orchard View School and is now an active community volunteer, particularly faithful to McMillan School's "Adopt-A-Reader" program. Because they have long been loyal supporters of the Reeths Puffer Schools, Mrs. Arter established this fund which will assist Reeths Puffer students in their study of fine arts at a college or summer camp.

Richard and Betty Cawein Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Dick and Betty Cawein, who established the Richard and Betty Cawein Scholarship Fund of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. In nearly 48 years of marriage, Dick and Betty Cawein had 28 different addresses but they found their way back to the place they really loved, their hometown of Muskegon. After a career in the Navy, Dick was a shop teacher at Mona Shores. Betty was involved with St. Jean's Church and the Muskegon Garden Club, but they both felt very strongly about education. Dick passed away in 1993 and Betty in 2015, but their love for Muskegon and their passion for education lives on in the Richard and Betty Cawein Scholarship Fund, created with a bequest from Betty's trust. It will help support students pursuing a Bachelor of Science degree who are doing two years at MCC and then going on to one of Michigan's public colleges/universities or Notre Dame or Duke.

Robert A. and Clara C. Harrell Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Robert A. and Clara C. Harrell, who established the Robert A. and Clara C. Harrell Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Clara is from Muskegon and her husband Bob is from East Detroit. Clara went to Muskegon Community College where she earned her Nursing degree. The Harrell's believe that education is vital and is the gateway to students becoming what they dream they can be. This scholarship is for graduating seniors of any Muskegon County High School.

Robert Busch Academic Athletic Memorial Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Carol Busch, who established the Robert Busch Academic Athletic Memorial Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Carol Busch graduated from Holton High School in 1949. Together they enjoyed small game hunting, sport fishing, and all that the outdoors had to offer. In fact, Robert Moran spent a great deal of time showing young people how to enjoy these activities safely and responsibly. They believed that deserving people who are given a break can and will succeed. This scholarship, established with a bequest following Mrs. Moran's death, will assist those who "may be in the middle of the class but have the desire, determination, and the aptitude to be a nurse."

Rocket Scholars Foundation Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the parents and alumni of Reeths Puffer Schools, who established the Rocket Scholars Foundation Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. The Rocket Scholars Foundation was created by parents and alumni with two purposes in mind: 1) to continue to foster within the school system a culture of rigorous academic achievement for all students and 2) to offer those students who have demonstrated high achievement, scholarships to help defray the increasingly expensive tuition costs at colleges, universities and accredited post-secondary vocational and technical schools.

<p>Rosalie R. and Paul F. Youngberg Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Rosalie R. and Paul F. Youngberg, who established the Rosalie R. Youngberg Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Shortly after World War II, Paul and Rosalie Youngberg moved to Muskegon, where he helped found several small companies. Although the Youngberg's had no children, they cherished the Muskegon community that they had adopted as their home and shared the desire to continue giving to this community after their lifetimes here had ended. To this end, the Youngberg's named the Community Foundation in their will, creating this Scholarship. The fund grants scholarship awards to Muskegon Community College graduates in the top 25 percent of their graduating class who will pursue higher education. Through this, the Youngberg's love for their community endures and continues to contribute to Muskegon County through the lasting gift of education.</i></p>
<p>Russell B. Trygstad Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Marian & Leland Wilson and Larry Trygstad, who established the Russell B. Trygstad Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Russell's daughter and son-in-law, Marian and Leland Wilson, and his son, Larry Trygstad, wanted to honor the memory of their father who was a pioneer in education in Holton, Michigan. Russell graduated from Holton School on May 2, 1902, later married Gussie Benson of Highland Park, Illinois, and together they raised twelve children, all of whom graduated from Holton High School. He had a life-long passion for education, serving not only on the Holton School District Board for over 38 years, twenty as its President, but also on the Muskegon County Board of Education and briefly on the State Board of Education, as well. Russell's children and descendants are proud of his educational accomplishments and have established this scholarship to provide scholarships to students at Holton High School in Russell Trygstad's name.</i></p>
<p>Ruth Skwarek Scholarship</p>	<p><i>This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Ruth Skwarek, who established the Ruth Skwarek Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Arlene, who taught school for 40 years would always ask questions about curriculum and the Winter Formal, while Art was more interested in the sports teams. Arthur Wood and Arlene Steere Wood were born during the depths of the Great Depression to struggling mid-western farm families. They went from shoeless, feed sack wearing children to college educated professionals with help from their supportive families, combined with their own grit and determination. The Walling Scholarship in Honor of Arthur and Arlene Wood is made possible by their depression-era values. Because they worked hard, ("Always work more than you are paid for."), and lived frugally ("Use it up and make due. Money doesn't grow on trees. Pay your savings account first."), they are still helping others ("There is always someone worse off than you, and you need to help them. Do unto others as you would have them do unto you")."

Warren and Mary Husid Culinary Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Mary Husid, who established the Warren and Mary Husid Culinary Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Munroe Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County in honor of her parents. The William D. Munroe and Marie P. Munroe Scholarship was created out of love and respect. Bonnie Bassett, daughter of Bill and Marie, learned all of her solid values from her hard working, unpretentious parents and wanted to honor them with a lasting legacy. Both grew up modestly, but both had Masters degrees in Education. They were dedicated educators and always stressed the importance of higher learning. Her father was Superintendent of Whitehall Schools for a brief three years, until his untimely death in 1953. So strong was his influence in this short time, that the gymnasium was dedicated and named for him. There are now six teachers in the family, including Bonnie, who is retired from Reeths Puffer Schools.

William G. Jackson Memorial Scholarship

Jackson was the developer and former owner of Burdick & Jackson Laboratories, a high-purity solvent producer still in operation in Muskegon today by Honeywell International Inc. Jackson, the Muskegon-based research boat of Grand Valley State University's Annis Water Research Institute. Jackson provided the lead gift for the research boat and was a key figure in raising funds for the GVSU Lake Michigan Center on Muskegon Lake. In 1996, he was awarded the Muskegon Area Environmental "Making Waves in Muskegon" Life Time Achievement Award. This scholarship is for Muskegon County residents pursuing any degree relating to geriatric care, preference to those attending Grand Valley State University.

William L. Tardani Notre Dame Scholarship
