Adam Visser Memorial Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Gene Gifford, who established the Adam Visser Memorial Scholarship Fund of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County in honor of Adam Visser a former Jayhawk all-conference player and a member of the 1990 national runner-up squad. Adam battled ALS (Lou Gehrig's Disease) for three years and passed away on February 16, 2007. "Adam was a tremendous competitor," said Gene Gifford, who coached him at MCC. He was a great person and a tremendous father and husband who courageously fought the battle against ALS.

Adult Student Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of donors who contributed to the Community Foundation for Muskegon County scholarship fund. This scholarship supports Muskegon County residents (or residents of a Muskegon-based school district) who have been out of high school for at least two years and/or have a gap in their post-secondary education. Adult students are often (but not always) prospective undergraduate students who are 25 years of age or older. Adult students may also have other identifying criteria, such as full-time employment, parenthood, care of elderly parents, or prior military service.

Alan G. (1954) and Margaret Drost (1957) Toxopeus Western Michigan Christian High School Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Alan & Margaret Toxopeus, who established the Alan G. (1954) and Margaret Drost (1957) Toxopeus Western Michigan Christian High School Scholarship of the Muskegon County Community Foundation. Alan and Margaret were Western MI Christian High School graduates - 1957/58. Allen attended Michigan State University and later became an accountant. Margaret attended Calvin College and later became a Radiologist. They created this scholarship fund because they appreciated the quality of the education they received at Western Michigan Christian High School. This scholarship is for graduating seniors of Western Michigan Christian High School.

Albrechtsen Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Dennis and Sue Albrechtsen, who established the Albrechtsen Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Dennis and Sue Albrechtsen are long-time Whitehall residents. Dennis is a former General Manager of Howmet Whitehall Casting. Having a genuine concern for students who may not be interested in pursuing a traditional college degree, they established the Albrechtsen Scholarship to assist Whitehall High School graduating seniors in attending technical or vocational training programs.

Albrechtsen-VanLoon Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Dennis and Sue Albrechtsen, who established the Albrechtsen-VanLoon Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Dennis and Sue Albrechtsen are long-time Whitehall residents. The Albrechtsens believe in Whitehall Schools. They wanted to support the work of John VanLoon, a former Whitehall High School Principal. This fund is unusual because it not only supports students but also rewards teachers who demonstrate the ability to motivate students to achieve at high levels. His goal is to impact lives.

Alex Christopher U.A.#174 Memorial Scholarship

This scholarship was created in memory of Alex Christopher and made possible by the generosity of his mother, Sharon, and members of U.A. #174. Alex was in his final year of a plumbers and pipefitters apprenticeship when he was killed in a motorcycle accident. With support from U.A.#174, Sharon Christopher created this fund to support other young people like her son. The awards may be used for tools, equipment, or other workforce supports as determined by U.A.#174.

Alfonso Loera Music Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the friends and family of Alfonso Loera, who established the Alfonso Loera Music Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Alfonso Loera was a gifted musician who continuously touched the hearts of all who knew him and heard him perform. Born and raised in Muskegon, Alfonso graduated from the Musicians' Institute in Hollywood and was well known for his guitar and singing talent. His life was tragically cut short at age 35, but his love of music will live on through the Alfonso Loera Music Scholarship Fund. This fund will enable young musicians to pursue their musical goals without being hindered by financial need.

Alice Mae McGuire Memorial Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Mr. Raymond J. McGuire, who established the Alice Mae McGuire Memorial Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County in memory of his wife, Alice. This scholarship is presented to students transferring from Muskegon Community College who attended MCC on a two-year, full-time basis and who will be pursuing a degree or certification at any Michigan-accredited educational institution.

American Legion Auxiliary Unit of Merritt Lamb Post No. 9 Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the American Legion Auxiliary Unit of Merritt Lamb Post No. 9, which established the American Legion Auxiliary Unit of Merritt Lamb Post No. 9 Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Annette M. Alberts-Dippel Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Helen M. Alberts, who established the Annette M. Alberts-Dippel Scholarship in memory of her daughter. A 1985 graduate of Reeths-Puffer High School, Annette was deeply involved in student life, participating in dance, volleyball, and tennis. Beyond athletics, Annette had a lifelong love of animals and a concern for their welfare. She went on to graduate from Michigan State University with a degree in Communications, building a career in that field before working in the Mattawan Schools library. The scholarship supports graduates of Reeths-Puffer High School whose interests – animal welfare, dance, volleyball, or tennis – reflect those that shaped Annette's life.

Archie A. and Elva M. Blood Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Archie Blood, Jr., who established the Archie A. and Elva M. Blood Scholarship Fund of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County to honor his parents. He says they were "silent givers." His father was a quiet war hero, and they both gave a great deal to the community without notoriety. They gave each of their children an opportunity for higher education, and Archie, Jr. felt it was time to give back.

Arthur and Ida Kuehn Memorial Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Floyd Kuehn, who established the Arthur and Ida Kuehn Memorial Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Muskegon native Floyd Kuehn spent his career in nursing and retired from Mercy General Health Partners in 1999. He has established a scholarship in his parents' name for students planning to pursue careers in nursing. Both Arthur and Ida Kuehn worked in the community. Arthur was a machinist at Continental Motors, and Ida worked at J.C. Penney's. Floyd Kuehn says that his parents' hard work and support enabled him to create this scholarship.

Barbara J. Lonnee Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Rudy and Barbara Lonnee, who established the Barbara J. Lonnee Scholarship of the Muskegon County Community Foundation. Rudy Lonnee and his wife, Barbara, had been longtime residents and contributing citizens of Ravenna. Rudy Lonnee's family founded Alloyed Gray Iron Foundry, a major employer in the Ravenna area for many years. Barbara taught in the Ravenna Public School system and served in the local Girl Scout program. Both loved the Ravenna community and wanted to make a lasting gift to its students. Rudy created the Barbara J. Lonnee Scholarship after Barbara's passing in honor of her. This scholarship represents the fulfillment of this generosity, which will continue to grant the lasting gift of education to the youth of their community.

Ben and Ruth Marcus Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Ruth Marcus, who established the Ben and Ruth Marcus Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Ruth Marcus was a champion of women here in Muskegon County for nearly half a century. Through her work as a board member at Muskegon Community College, Community Mental Health, Every Woman's Place, and Muskegon Area Planned Parenthood, she served as an advocate for women, inspiring them to pursue higher education, to take a greater role in the political arena, and to let their voice be heard in important causes. Her husband, Ben, was a leading worker's compensation attorney and a pioneer in this field. Ben Marcus came to Muskegon after World War II, a time when over 50 workers a year were dying in Muskegon Foundries due to lung disease. In 1995, he was inducted into the Michigan Worker's Hall of Fame and received the State Bar of Michigan's Champion of Justice Award. His work on behalf of Michigan's workers will remain a strong legacy in the field of labor law. The Marcus' Fund will provide financial assistance to area students who will attend Muskegon Community College.

Bernard J. DeVries Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of JoAnn DeVries, who established the Bernard J. DeVries Scholarship Fund of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. JoAnn established the Bernard J. DeVries Scholarship Fund in memory of her father, Bernard. The fund will be used to present scholarships to graduating seniors, with preference to those graduating from Muskegon High School. The recipients must be pursuing a degree program at an accredited four-year college, university, or vocational/technical school.

Beverley Turner Memorial Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Peter Turner, who established the Beverley Turner Memorial Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Beverley Turner moved to Muskegon from Canada in 1972 and shortly thereafter became an instructor at Muskegon Community College. This has been established in memory of Beverley by her husband, Peter Turner. The grant scholarship awards to graduates of Muskegon Community College who wish to continue their education. This and its purpose reflect Beverley Turner's lifelong interest in and dedication to excellence in education. To the credit of Mr. Turner and his generosity, Beverley Turner continues to inspire academic excellence in the Muskegon youth through the lasting gift of education.

Beyrle-Hollowell Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Joseph and JoAnne Beyrle, who established the Beyrle-Hollowell Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Joseph and JoAnne Beyrle were long-time community supporters and special friends of the Frauenthal Center for the Performing Arts. This scholarship was established by Joseph and JoAnne upon the death of JoAnne's mother, Anne Hollowell, as a lasting memorial to each of their families. William and Elizabeth Beyrle, Joe's parents, were from families who immigrated to Muskegon from Germany in the mid-1800s. Anne Hollowell and her husband, Dee, Vice President of the Aircraft Division of Continental Motors Corp. from 1939 to 1966, were both active community supporters. Joe was a famous WWII hero in both the US and Russia. Through the establishment of the Beyrle-Hollowell Scholarship, the fund will assist students studying abroad and/or provide non-traditional scholarships to upgrade skills to gain employment.

Bill and Dorothy Boyden Rotary/YMCA Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the family of Bill Boyden, who established the Bill Boyden Rotary - YFCA Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Bill Boyden owned Boyden Electric for 30 years and served as President of the YFCA and Rotary Boards of Directors. He showed a strong interest in promoting youth's leadership abilities, and when he died in 1980, his family established this award to recognize them. Accordingly, this award goes to a deserving individual who displays the leadership qualities Bill valued so highly. Through this, Bill Boyden will continue to promote leadership among young people in Muskegon.

Bruce and Antonia Privacky Memorial Scholarship

The entire community was devastated by the tragedy of Bruce and Antonia, who died in a car crash. Bruce & Shirley established this in memory of their grandchildren, Bruce and Antonia Privacky. This scholarship is for Coopersville and Ravenna students attending any "public" college/university in the state of Michigan.

Busker Family Fund Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Walter E. Busker, who established the Busker Family Fund of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Walter Busker was a long-time Muskegon resident and a member of the First Congregational Church. He joined Campbell, Wyant, and Cannon in 1951 as Chief Financial Officer. He served in several positions until his retirement in 1976. As their four children grew up, the Buskers continually emphasized the importance of education. The Busker Family Fund mirrors these values, as one-third of the income from the Fund provides scholarships for young people in the Muskegon area. Through the creation of the Busker Family Fund, Walter Busker's emphasis on education has grown into a lasting reality, granting the permanent gift of education to the youth of his community.

Busker Family Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the William Busker family, who established the Busker Family Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. This is a competitive scholarship for the study of science, technology, engineering, math, teaching, nursing, accounting, or a trade or vocational skills. You have been chosen because we believe that you have the ability and are motivated to reach your potential. The Busker family believes that by completing your education, you will be able to improve your own economic well-being, as well as the well-being of your community. They also believe that giving back should begin early and become a lifelong habit. Byam Family Scholarship

Carolyn worked at Muskegon Community College for most of her career, serving as Interim President for two years and as an Executive Assistant to five presidents. Peter co-founded Shape Corporation and invented products for the office furniture and automotive industries, holding many US patents. During their lifetimes, this fund supported the construction of MCC's Sturrus Technology Center, and it now provides scholarships for adult students living and working in Muskegon County and attending Muskegon Community College.

Charles and Carol Mullally Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of an anonymous donor, who established the Charles and Carol Mullally Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. This scholarship is for Reeths-Puffer High School graduating seniors who have demonstrated academic achievement.

Charles and Jessie Goodnow Educational Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Charles and Jessie Goodnow, who established the Charles and Jessie Goodnow Educational Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Sometimes, it is the very quiet people who ask for little but, through their generosity, truly make a difference in the world. Charles and Jessie Goodnow had vacationed in Muskegon for years and loved the area so much that they moved here in the 1930s and made Muskegon their home. Although neither of them attended college, both appreciated the value of education. The Goodnows lived an austere lifestyle that enabled them to build a sizable estate, and since they had no children of their own, they chose to use their estate to make a gift of education to Muskegon area students. The Goodnows produced this gift by creating the Community Foundation's first scholarship. The income from this fund has awarded over one and a half million dollars in scholarships to Muskegon youth, continuing to grant Charles and Jessie Goodnow's lasting gift of education to the current and future generations of Muskegon County youth.

Charles D. & Virginia Gay Van Vleck Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Charlie and Gay Van Vleck, whose bequest established the Charles D. & Virginia Gay Van Vleck Scholarship Fund of the Community Foundation of Muskegon County. Charlie Van Vleck was a salesman his entire life, starting in a shoe store at age 17 and finishing with a 30-year career with Shaw Barton of Ohio. He was an Optimist member for 49 years, a cancer survivor, an active volunteer, and a member of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, along with his wife, Gay. Raised in Arkansas, Gay was a high school valedictorian and earned a master's degree. Her career path included teaching, working for Delta Airlines, and serving as executive director of the Girl Scout Council in Michigan, where she met Charlie, a board member. She retired from the Muskegon School District as an English/Journalism teacher. Their scholarship awards are for Muskegon County residents pursuing an undergraduate degree.

Charlotte M. Martin Classical Music Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Charlotte M. Martin, who established the Charlotte M. Martin Classical Music Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Charlotte Martin wanted her interest in classical music to continue after her death in February 2002. This Fund will be used to provide scholarships to students planning to study classical music who need assistance to do so. In this way, Ms. Martin's thoughtful giving will help assure the future of the musical arts community in Muskegon.

Cheryl Duff Memorial Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the friends and family of Cheryl Duff, who established the Cheryl Duff Memorial Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Cheryl Duff, an extremely valued community member, participated actively in the world around her. This included involving herself with Immanuel Lutheran Church and teaching Sunday school. She was 28 when she died in a tragic automobile accident in June of 1991. Friends and family have established this in Cheryl's memory. Through this award, Cheryl's desire to help and give to others will continue to benefit the community.

Cutler Family Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the Robert M. Cutler family, who established the Cutler Family Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Robert Cutler was a retired Howmet executive and a former County Commissioner. His wife, Betsy, taught and provided counseling for 19 years at Reeths-Puffer High School while also serving as President of the Michigan Pine and Dunes Girl Scout Council. The Cutlers both devoted themselves to community activism and highly valued education. Accordingly, they wanted to make a gift to help young people in the community pursue higher education. This inspiration became the Cutler Family Scholarship through a gift to the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. The award is for a Reeths-Puffer graduate who excels in math and/or science and plans to pursue a degree in either of these disciplines. By creating this scholarship, the Cutlers elevated their regard for education into a lasting reality, granting the youth of their community a permanent gift of education.

C. Wesley Wilbur and Jacqueline Wilbur Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the family and friends of C. Wesley Wilbur, who established the C. Wesley Wilbur Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Wesley served his community as a business leader and a community advocate. After his death in 1989, Mr. Wilbur's family and friends established this scholarship in his memory, honoring his character and service to the Muskegon community. This awards a scholarship to a Mona Shores High School graduate pursuing a degree in chemical or environmental engineering. To the credit of C. Wesley Wilbur's family and friends, Mr. Wilbur continues to support the Muskegon community, granting the lasting gift of education.

Dan White Memorial Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Dan White's family, who established the Dan White Memorial Scholarship Fund in his memory. The fund was set up after Dan White, a 5th-grade teacher at Campbell Elementary School, was killed by a drunk driver. Dan created a legacy of outstanding passion for teaching his students and dedication to advancing his profession. In his role at Campbell School, he invigorated his love of teaching with dedication and exuberance. This scholarship provides financial assistance to students enrolled in the teaching field or another human services "giving back" profession.

Darrell H. and Rosaline M. Smith Scholarship

Dennis L. and Susan K. Emmons Instrumental Music Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Dennis & Susan Emmons, who established the Dennis L. and Susan K. Emmons Instrumental Music Scholarship. A graduate of Muskegon High School and Michigan State University, Dennis taught at Grant Public Schools from 1965 to 1967 before returning to Muskegon. He was a band Director at Nelson Junior High from 1967-1970, and was named band director at North Muskegon Public Schools in the fall of 1970. Dennis returned to Muskegon in the fall of 1986, serving as director at Bunker Middle School and assisting at Muskegon High School until his retirement in 1994. This scholarship supports band students at North Muskegon High School, Muskegon High School, and Reeths-Puffer High School.

Dollie Mae Damm Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Dorothy Boyden, Jane McPherson, and Peter Damm, who established the Dollie Mae Damm Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Hispanic Community Services Coalition Scholarship

The mission of the Hispanic Services Coalition of Muskegon County is to serve the Hispanic community through education, health information, and services as an instrument to improve their quality of life. This scholarship is for graduating Hispanic or Latino seniors who are residents of and/or attend high school in Muskegon County.

Howard Oosterhouse Scholarship

Dedicated to youth and guided by his faith, he created this scholarship to continue supporting students beyond his lifetime.

Hugh and Peg Campbell Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Peggy Elliott and Hugh Campbell, who established the Hugh and Peg Campbell Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County in memory of Peg Campbell. Margaretha (Peg) Campbell graduated from Muskegon High School, and her husband, Hugh, from Muskegon Heights High School. They went on to raise seven children here. Joe Guylas "MichKid" Scholarship

Paul Dunworth lived by these words, as evidenced by his charitable donation that will continue to provide students in Muskegon County with a permanent gift of education.

Judith G. Singerling and John J. Singerling, Sr. Scholarship

Singerling, Sr. Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Judith Singerling loved education. By establishing the Lapomarda Family Scholarship, Jessica and Nicole hope to ensure that graduating seniors of Orchard View High School have that opportunity.

Larry and Jane Wright Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Jane Wright, who established the Larry & Jane Wright Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Jane Wright wanted to honor her husband Larry, who served as a trustee at Muskegon Community College. She started this scholarship Fund in his memory. Larry was very active in his work on behalf of people with disabilities. Before he passed, they began discussing a scholarship for a student to attend MCC. Upon his death, Jane pursued starting this scholarship in his name.

Larry Harp Scholarship

"Coach" was a gym teacher at Muskegon High School. In 1971, it was Larry Harp's first year as head varsity coach. The Big Reds won a huge victory over previously unbeaten Traverse City before 10,000 fans at Hackley Stadium, ended the year undefeated, and were proclaimed Michigan's Class A football state champions by the statewide media at season's end. Muskegon finished the 1979 season with a 7-2-0 record and a Lake Michigan Athletic Conference championship. It was Coach Harp's final year. He stepped down to become the school's athletic director.

Lawrence R. DeVoogd Scholarship

Margaret Curtis wished to establish two scholarships: one for females pursuing careers in nursing or health care, and the other for a male pursuing a vocational, technical, or trade career. Mrs. Curtis, a nurse in the area, provided for this fund in her will in memory of her husband and herself. She stated that the income would be used to award scholarships in two fields, nursing and vocational training.

In 2020, they topped their initial goal of \$25,000, and the Muskegon High School Class of 1959 Legacy Fund was created. Ted and Don are still working to build the fund to increase the impact because they know the value of education.

Muskegon Public Schools Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Muskegon Public Schools, which established the Muskegon Public Schools Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. For many years, Muskegon Public Schools has administered several scholarships to benefit Muskegon County high school students. Following a review of these scholarships and recognizing the Community Foundation's considerable expertise not only in scholarship programming but also in investment management, the Board of Education approved a recommendation to transfer all scholarships held by Muskegon Public Schools to the Muskegon County Community Foundation, thus creating the Muskegon Public Schools Scholarship. The Community Foundation is proud to receive this honor and looks forward to working with Muskegon Public Schools administrators to award scholarships to Muskegon-area high school seniors for many years to come.

Muskegon Surgical Associates Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the Muskegon Surgical Associates, P.C., who established the Muskegon Surgical Associates Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. The doctors in this surgical group wanted to fulfill their corporate responsibility and contribute back to the community. This scholarship award is for medical school students.

Nancy Waters and Mark Waters Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Nancy and Mark Waters, who established the Nancy Waters and Mark Waters Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. In recognition of what this community has meant to their family, Nancy and her son, Mark, started this to support African Americans' educational, economic, and community development needs and interests in the greater Muskegon region. Their leadership demonstrates how the Community Foundation can reach and support all its citizens. Mark passed away in 2015.

This scholarship shall support students attending Muskegon Community College. Nan herself loves to read and loves her community of Fruitport. She serves on the Fruitport District Library and supports Fruitport through another fund in her name at the Community Foundation.

Nan Riekse Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Nan Riekse, who established the Nan Riekse Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Nan Riekse has a lofty dream: to inspire. By establishing the Nan Riekse Scholarship and the Nan Riekse Donor Advised Funds, she has taken an important step toward realizing her dream. Her Scholarship will support non-traditional students attending Muskegon Community College with financial needs. Her scholarships will target adult women attending school after raising their children or rebuilding their lives following a divorce. The Donor Advised Fund will benefit local churches and a senior care center. Nan is an outstanding example of the "Power of One."

Neil J. Sanders Scholarship

This scholarship was made possible by the generosity of Jill Sanders, who established the Neil J. Sanders Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County in honor of her husband, Neil. A lover of the outdoors, Neil Sanders enjoyed hiking and backpacking with his sons and friends. He was interested in all kinds of sports and activities, reading mysteries and thrillers, mountain climbing, and teaching yoga. Thirty-three years of his life were devoted to counseling students at Muskegon Community College. So, his wife, Jill, memorialized his name forever with a scholarship fund. As you may expect, the fund will support students who plan to attend MCC.

Neil Rosen/Cherry County Playhouse Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Joni D. Rosen, who established the Neil Rosen/Cherry County Playhouse Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County in memory of her husband, Neil Rosen. In 1990, the Community Foundation approached Neil Rosen and Cherry County Playhouse and encouraged them to relocate from Traverse City, making Muskegon's Frauenthal Theater the Playhouse's new home. Muskegon was never the same! Neil quickly became one of Muskegon's greatest advocates. In addition to his inimitable antics and sense of humor, Neil Rosen brought world-class talent to Muskegon and put it on the stage. He fought against his illness for many, many months, and when he knew the end was near, he asked his friends to celebrate, not to weep. His wife, Joni, asked that the many memorials to Neil be used to establish a scholarship to reward a Muskegon County winner of the Student Showcase in the Performing Arts Category.

Nikolas Wypa Scholarship

This scholarship was created by Nikolas Wypa's friends and family through the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Nikolas was an energetic, kind 6-year-old who loved playing with his Matchbox cars, spending time with friends and his brother, and greeting neighbors each day. He also loved school and spent many happy hours there. In his memory, a \$500 scholarship is awarded annually to one 5th grader at each Mona Shores elementary school. The award supports future education and honors students who demonstrate honesty, kindness, and good citizenship—qualities that defined Nikolas' life.

Scholarships

Norine Clark Family Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Norine M. Clark, who established the Norine Clark Family Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Norine spent over 30 years teaching in Ravenna elementary schools, leaving lasting impressions on her students. She loved reading, taught music on piano and organ, and was involved in her church. Their family owned a blueberry farm, and her husband, Wayne, served as a township supervisor and a member of the Blueberry Association board. The scholarship supports graduating seniors from Ravenna High School pursuing degrees in agriculture or teaching, carrying on the Clark family legacy.

Norman J. and Maureen L. Campbell Family Scholarship

This scholarship was established by Maureen Campbell through the Community Foundation for Muskegon County in memory of her husband, Norman J. Campbell. A graduate of Muskegon Heights High School and the University of Michigan, Norman was a mechanical engineer who worked on the SR-71 Blackbird at Lockheed before continuing his career with General Electric. He later returned to Muskegon to help lead the family business, Campbell Grinder Company, serving as president until his retirement in 2001. Known for treating employees like family, Norman valued hard work, humility, and time with loved ones. This scholarship supports students attending the University of Michigan, with preference given to engineering majors and secondary consideration to nursing students.

Oliver and Mildred Byam Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of George and Mary Ann Byam, son and daughter-in-law of Oliver and Mildred Byam, who established the Oliver and Mildred Byam Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. The Oliver and Mildred Byam Scholarship benefits the recipient of the annual Oliver R. Byam Sports Award and the Geraldine Beausang Sports Award at Whitehall High School. The award was established in the 1960s and is given to the senior boy and girl who best exemplify Oliver Byam's ideals and standards in his sports participation and attitude. The Byams both formerly worked for the Whitehall school district, Mildred as a kindergarten teacher, and Oliver as a high school teacher and basketball and track coach.

Pat Bard, a wife, mother, grandmother, businesswoman, travel agent, teacher, and friend, passed away on May 21, 2010. Doug and Pat had talked of a scholarship in the past and, toward the end of her fight against cancer, together chose the field of nursing as the focus. While Pat's career involved business and travel, she and Doug experienced first-hand the impact that caring, well-trained nurses can make. The scholarship in her name will also make an impact on the opportunities available to nursing students.

Paul DeVette Education Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Bertha DeVette, who established the Paul DeVette Education Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Paul DeVette was a respected educator in the Muskegon Public Schools for 32 years, serving as Principal at Nelson School and as a teacher at Steele Junior High School before his retirement in 1962. His wife, Bertha, established the Paul DeVette Education to honor his memory. Paul DeVette's many friends, fellow educators, and former students also contributed to this scholarship in his memory. The award provides scholarships to graduating Muskegon High School seniors who plan to pursue a career in teaching and who hope to uphold the exemplary standard set by Paul DeVette's commitment to teaching.

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of William H. and Marilyn G. Schimanski, who established the Paul Schimanski Memorial Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County in memory of their son. Paul was born in Muskegon in 1963 and graduated in 1981 from Mona Shores High School. He went on to graduate with high honors from Michigan Technological University, receiving his Bachelor of Science degree in Mechanical Engineering in 1985. A year later, he received a Master's of Science degree in Mechanical Engineering from the University of Michigan. He died in a tragic automobile accident in 1999. Paul was a Project Engineer with General Dynamics at the time of his death. Paul valued the quality education he received at MTU. This Scholarship will afford others the same benefits.

Peter J. & Barbara J. Kutches Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Barbara Kutches, who established the Peter J. and Barbara J. Kutches Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Pete and Barbara Kutches are well-known figures in the Muskegon area, even though they both grew up in Escanaba. Pete was a coach in the area stretching over 4 decades at Muskegon High School, Muskegon Catholic Central, and finally Reeths-Puffer before retiring in the late 1990s. He was best known as a football coach, winning state championships as a head coach at MCC and R-P, the only coach in the state of Michigan to do so. Barbara worked as a nurse at Mercy Hospital for several years, serving as the director of nursing. They shared 62 years of marriage, 5 children, 15 grandchildren, and soon-to-be 15 great-grandchildren. Pete was the 10th of 13 kids in his family, and the only one to go on to earn a college degree, thanks to a scholarship he was awarded. Because of this, Pete and Barbara both felt strongly that they wanted to provide that opportunity to area youth, specifically in the areas in which they felt rewarded in their careers - education, and nursing.

Privacky Memorial Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the members of the Reeths-Puffer Education Association, who established the Privacky Memorial Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. The entire community was devastated by the tragedy of the Privacky family deaths. Steve Privacky was a long-time elementary teacher and a member of the Reeths-Puffer Education Association, which, along with other colleagues and friends, established this in memory of the Privacky Family. It will provide scholarships to graduating Reeths-Puffer students "who exhibit moral character and leadership" and pursue careers in education or human services at educational institutions in Michigan.

Pulaski Lodge Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the Pulaski Lodge, which established the Pulaski Lodge Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. After decades in Muskegon, the Pulaski Lodge closed its doors. However, it left behind a substantial endowment to fund scholarships for graduates of Muskegon High School and Muskegon Catholic Central High School. While it's open to all, preference is given to the children or grandchildren of the lodge's final membership in 2021.

Ravenna Community Educational Foundation Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of many people in the Ravenna Community, who established the Ravenna Community Educational Foundation Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Dolores E. (Dee) Swanson gave the initial gift to start this in December 2006. At that time, it was a Build A Fund, but a gift from Rudolph and Ruth Lonnee put it over the top late in 2007. The Ravenna Community Educational Foundation intends to use it to enhance the quality of education by providing educational opportunities, generating and distributing financial and other resources to benefit the students and staff of the Ravenna Community Schools.

Raymond and Teresa Cioe Scholarship

This scholarship was established by Raymond and Teresa Cioe through the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Ray and his sisters, Teresa and Angela, lived simply and saved diligently, sharing a lifelong goal of helping students pursue a faith-based education. Ray worked at Continental Motors before earning a degree to teach, and he began his career at Catholic Central in 1954. He served in multiple roles, including teacher, coach, and athletic director, and was honored with the Muskegon Area Sports Hall of Fame Distinguished Service Award in 1993. Through their estate, the Cioes created this fund to support Muskegon-area students attending independent colleges such as Notre Dame, Aquinas, or Albion.

Reading is the Key Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Lori Goryl, who established the Reading is the Key Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. After several years of teaching, Lori Goryl found her professional home in the Title 1 program, where small-group teaching helps students who need an extra boost. Her Adopt-A-Reader Program at Reeths-Puffer McMillan Elementary has been pairing up reading volunteers with elementary students for 13 years. Lori has since retired but still wants to continue encouraging children to pursue higher educational goals. She established this scholarship fund for McMillan Elementary students to help with college expenses.

Reverend Moses J. Jones Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Reverend Moses J. Jones, who established the Reverend Moses J. Jones Endowment Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Born in 1898, Reverend Moses J. Jones was one of Muskegon's most beloved ministers. The Pastor of John Wesley A.M.E. Zion Church of Muskegon for 36 years, he founded the Urban League of Muskegon and received numerous honors, including the Ambassador of Goodwill Award. Reverend Jones committed his life to building racial harmony in Muskegon. He helped establish this Scholarship in 1982 to award deserving youths based on their contributions to their community, school, and church. Through this, Reverend Moses J. Jones continues to support the values of community awareness and harmony by granting the lasting gift of education to Muskegon-area youth. Reverend Jones died in 1989. His legacy lives on through this fund.

Richard and Barbara Arter Fine Arts Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Barbara Arter, who established the Richard and Barbara Arter Fine Arts Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County in memory of Dick Arter. This fund was established following Dick Arter's unexpected death while wintering in Arizona. He was Vice President of Howmet Corporation until his retirement. He was an active member of Community United Methodist Church and a past President of the Reeths-Puffer Board of Education and United Way. Before Barbara's retirement, she taught sixth grade at Orchard View School and is now an active community volunteer, particularly faithful to McMillan School's "Adopt-A-Reader" program. Because they have long been loyal supporters of the Reeths-Puffer Schools, Mrs. Arter established this fund to assist Reeths-Puffer students in their study of fine arts at a college or summer camp.

Richard and Betty Cawein Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Dick and Betty Cawein, who established the Richard and Betty Cawein Scholarship Fund of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. In nearly 48 years of marriage, Dick and Betty Cawein had 28 different addresses, but they found their way back to the place they loved, their hometown of Muskegon. After a career in the Navy, Dick was a shop teacher at Mona Shores. Betty was involved with St. Jean's Church and the Muskegon Garden Club, and both groups felt strongly about education. Dick passed away in 1993 and Betty in 2015, but their love for Muskegon and their passion for education live on in the Richard and Betty Cawein Scholarship Fund, created with a bequest from Betty's trust. It will help support students pursuing a Bachelor of Science degree who complete two years at MCC and then go on to one of Michigan's public colleges/universities, Notre Dame, or Duke.

Rich McCarthy Oakridge Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Nancy McCarthy, who established the Rich McCarthy Oakridge Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Rich McCarthy knew what mattered most in life. His philosophy was: "One hundred years from now, it will not matter what kind of car I drove or what kind of clothes I wore. All that will matter is that I made a difference in the life of a child." His family members, who have established the Rich McCarthy Oakridge Scholarship in his memory, say he far surpassed his goal, affecting the lives of scores of young people. The teaching veteran and coach had a rich career at Oakridge and several other area schools. Although he struggled with severe health problems for many years, he is remembered by his wife, Nancy, as "always smiling; his greatest joy was making people laugh." The scholarship will benefit students of Oakridge Schools.

Robert A. and Clara C. Harrell Scholarship

Harrell Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Clara is from Muskegon, and her husband, Bob, is from East Detroit. Clara went to Muskegon Community College, where she earned her Nursing degree. The Harrells believe that education is vital and the gateway to students becoming what they dream of becoming. This scholarship is for graduating seniors of any Muskegon County High School.

Robert Busch Academic Athletic Memorial Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Carol Busch, who established the Robert Busch Academic Athletic Memorial Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Carol Busch graduated from Holton High School in 1949. The purpose of this fund is to provide an annual scholarship to a graduating senior from Holton High School who has been outstanding in the academic and athletic areas.

Robert F. and Augusta A. Moran, R.N. Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Augusta A. Moran, who established the Robert F. and Augusta A. Moran, RN Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Robert and Augusta Moran were ordinary people who lived ordinary lives. Bob Moran retired as a yard master for the C & O Railroad after 40 years of service, and Gussie Moran was a homemaker who also worked as a clerk at Parson's Clothing in Muskegon Heights. Together, they enjoyed small-game hunting, sport fishing, and all that the outdoors had to offer. In fact, Robert Moran spent a great deal of time showing young people how to enjoy these activities safely and responsibly. They believed deserving young people who are given a break can succeed. This scholarship, established with a bequest following Mrs. Moran's death, will assist those who "may be in the middle of the class but have the desire, determination, and the aptitude to be a nurse."

Rocket Scholars/April Anne Boss Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of April Anne Boss's parents. April graduated from Reeths-Puffer High School in 1997. She was active in the choir and in many church-related activities as she completed her high school years. She chose to attend Muskegon Community College after high school. She loved children and wanted to make a difference in their lives by pursuing a teaching degree in Elementary Education. April was a loving daughter, sister, and friend. She was always willing to give a hug to people she loved and to friends she knew. Her parents would like her to be remembered and honored in a special way; therefore, they have established this scholarship in her loving memory. Their wish is to help future Reeths-Puffer graduates as they pursue a college degree.

Rocket Scholars Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of the parents and alumni of Reeths-Puffer Schools, who established the Rocket Scholars Foundation Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Upon her husband's death, she established the Rolland and Irene Damm Scholarship to ensure that students realize their college education dreams.

Rosalie R. and Paul F. Youngberg Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Rosalie R. and Paul F. Youngberg, who established the Rosalie R. Youngberg Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Shortly after World War II, Paul and Rosalie Youngberg moved to Muskegon, where he helped found several small companies. Although the Youngbergs had no children, they cherished the Muskegon community that they had adopted as their home. They shared the desire to continue giving to this community after their lifetimes here had ended. To this end, the Youngbergs named the Community Foundation in their will, creating this Scholarship. The fund awards scholarships to Muskegon Community College graduates in the top 25 percent of their class who plan to pursue higher education. Through this, the Youngberg's love for their community endures and continues to contribute to Muskegon County through the lasting gift of education.

Russell B. Trygstad Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Marian & Leland Wilson and Larry Trygstad, who established the Russell B. Trygstad Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Russell's daughter and son-in-law, Marian and Leland Wilson, and his son, Larry Trygstad, wanted to honor their father, a pioneer in education in Holton, Michigan. Russell graduated from Holton School on May 2, 1902, later married Gussie Benson of Highland Park, Illinois, and together they raised twelve children, all of whom graduated from Holton High School. He had a lifelong passion for education, serving not only on the Holton School District Board for over 38 years, 20 of them as its President, but also on the Muskegon County Board of Education and briefly on the State Board of Education. Russell's children and descendants are proud of his educational accomplishments and have established this scholarship in Russell Trygstad's name to support students at Holton High School.

Ruth Skwarek Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Ruth Skwarek, who established the Ruth Skwarek Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. Education was very important to Ruth Skwarek. She was a Fulbright Scholar and entered college at 16, earning a degree from Western Michigan University, a master's in French from Michigan State University, and a master's in French and Speech from Western Michigan University. She taught elementary grades at Grand Haven and Holland public schools and French and German at Muskegon Community College for 20 years. The Ruth Skwarek Scholarship will assist Muskegon County students pursuing four-year degrees at any college or university. Ms. Skwarek is particularly concerned that this will assist students from "middle-income" families, for whom little other aid is available.

Sailor Classic Athletic Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by generous donors who are committed to Mona Shores and to athletes who learn and play on their athletic fields. They started the Sailor Classic over a decade ago to raise money for items needed that fall outside the Athletic Department's budget. In addition, the Classic allows the community to celebrate all the school does for kids. Most importantly, the Sailor Classic provides an annual scholarship to one male and one female student-athlete who are outstanding on the field and in the classroom and in need of financial support.

Shantz Kaydon Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Richard and Dolores Shantz, who established the Shantz Kaydon Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. For many years, Richard Shantz, President and CEO of Muskegon's Kaydon Corporation, strongly believed in the value of a college education. In the tradition of giving back to the community and the company that was good to him, Dick Shantz and his wife, Dolores, established the Shantz Kaydon Scholarship to benefit the children and step-children of employees of Kaydon Corporation in its Muskegon locations. This scholarship award of \$12,000 over four years will help ensure that the children of Kaydon Corporation employees receive a quality education far into the future.

Sharon Barber Memorial Scholarship

Sharon was a special Orchard View teacher for 35 years. Known for her warmth and wonderful smile, Mrs. Barber touched the lives of hundreds of children. So many former students have mentioned her positive outlook as their motivation to persevere in their own lives. Mrs. Barber received the 2003 "My Cool Teacher" award from WZZM-TV for her dedication. Sharon died in April 2004. Her husband, Neal, created this fund to award scholarships to Orchard View graduating seniors.

Sidney and Ann DeBoer Geriatric Nursing Scholarship

Over the years, they have given financial support to many nursing students at MCC. The Sidney and Ann DeBoer Geriatric Nursing Scholarship was established in 1994 by Andrew, John, and Samuel DeBoer, sons of Sidney and Ann DeBoer, in honor of their mother's 80th birthday, to continue the DeBoers' long-standing tradition of supporting the educational pursuits of Muskegon County nursing students at Muskegon Community College.

Spencer Weersing Memorial Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Sally Weersing and her family, who established the Spencer Weersing Memorial Scholarship of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County. He was an inspiration to everyone whose life he touched. With memorials received in his memory, Dr. Weersing's family has established this scholarship to memorialize his devotion to life and to pass on his exemplary community spirit. The Spencer Weersing Memorial Scholarship will help Muskegon County high school graduates attend the University of Michigan, beginning a legacy in Dr. Weersing's name that grows in the hearts and minds of the community he so loved and supported.

Stanley C. and Maxine G. Sutherland Scholarship

This scholarship has been made possible by the generosity of Stanley Sutherland, Jr., who established the Stanley C. and Maxine G. Sutherland Scholarship. Education was important to Maxine Sutherland. In 1954, they were transferred to Montague with other employees when Hooker built the plant here on Whitbeck Road. They bought a house on White Lake, where Tom grew up, and his parents spent the rest of their lives. They saved money for their son Tom to go to college. Tom graduated from Montague High School and went on to Michigan Tech, where he earned his engineering degree. He then worked at Howmet until his retirement in 2009.

Viola Mikkelson - Robert Eilers Nursing Scholarship

Because they worked hard ("Always work more than you are paid for."), and lived frugally ("Use it up and make do. Money doesn't grow on trees. Pay your savings account first."), they are still helping others ("There is always someone worse off than you, and you need to help them. Do unto others as you would have them do unto you").
